Isaiah has a special place in our lives, especially in Advent and Holy Week. Here are just a few representations of the prophet in Christian art. Which do you prefer?







This statue of Isaiah by Salvatore Revelli is part of the marble base of the Column of the Immaculate Conception in Rome. The column itself is 40 ft. high. The firemen of Rome helped erect it in 1857.



On the 8th December each year, a very special ceremony takes place at Rome's Column of the Immaculate Conception, near the famous Spanish Steps. One of the city's firemen places a wreath on the arm of Our Lady. Often, the reigning Pope is present, and this year Pope Francis made sure that he was there. In his prayer to Mary, the Pope said: "In this time that leads up to the feast of Jesus' birth, teach us how to go against the current... Teach people how to be unencumbered... to give ourselves, to listen, to be silent, to not focus on ourselves, but to leave space for the beauty of God, the source of true joy." We heed Francis's call to be free of the slavery of materialism and to concentrate on the spiritual and the poor. It's a proud day for the firemen of Rome. Perhaps we should remember our own firemen and all that they do for our community
