

It could also help us articulate our faith in the saving love of Christ as we drink from the chalice at Mass.

Blood of Christ, only-begotten Son of the eternal Father Blood of Christ, Incarnate Word of God Blood of Christ, of the New and Eternal Testament Blood of Christ, falling upon the earth in Gethsemane Blood of Christ, shed profusely in the Scourging Blood of Christ, flowing forth in the Crowning with Thorns

St. Giles is one of the principal streets of Oxford. In it is the *Eagle and Child* public house, made famous by two men: one a devout Catholic, the other an Anglican convert of Ulster Protestant background. They often met here with their closest friends, calling themselves "the Inklings". The two men were J.R.R. Tolkien, author of *The Lord of the Rings*, and C.S. Lewis, the writer who made the Christian faith accessible to millions through his books and radio broadcasts. Both were professors at Oxford University and lifelong friends.

There was once another public house in St. Giles, called the *Catherine Wheel*. Humphrey Pritchard was its "pot boy". Nowadays we would call him a barman. He lived during the Elizabethan persecution. He converted to the Catholic faith and was eventually condemned to death along with two priests and one of the local gentry.

On the scaffold Humphrey Pritchard said, "I call all people here present to bear witness, in this world, and on the Day of Judgement, that I die because I am a Catholic, a faithful Christian of Holy Church." One of the academics in the crowd mocked Pritchard, calling him a poor wretch who in his ignorance did not know what "Catholic" meant. To this Humphrey Pritchard replied: "I may not be able to tell you in words what it means to be a Catholic, God knows my heart, and that which I am unable to explain in words I am here to explain and attest with my blood."

The words of the Litany come to mind: "Blood of Christ, courage of martyrs", as do the words of Our Saviour when speaking of the persecutions that lay ahead: "Keep this carefully in mind: you are not to prepare your defence, because I myself will give you an eloquence and wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to resist or contradict." (Luke 21:25)

Humphrey Pritchard was beatified by Pope John Paul II in 1987. Today, 5th July, is his Memorial Day.

In 1962, the *Eagle and Child* was renovated, depriving Tolkien, Lewis and their friends of the privacy they had enjoyed. Reluctantly, they moved to the nearby *Lamb and Flag*.
