We see here the Catholic Cathedral of Nagasaki before and after the atomic bomb was dropped on the city on the 9th August, 1945. It was just 500 metres from the epicentre of the explosion. 8,500 of the Cathedral's 12,000 parishioners perished. One of those who survived was Dr. Takashi Nagai. Despite his own serious wounds, he immediately dedicated himself to the care of the injured.

Takashi was a convert to the Catholic faith, largely through the example of the Moriyama family, with whom he lodged. For three centuries, in the face of terrible persecution, the Moriyamas' ancestors had secretly preserved the Catholic faith. The faith and goodness of young Midori Moriyama in particular brought Nagai to his baptism in 1934. Shortly afterwards, he and Midori were married. Theirs would be a union of faith, prayer and service as well as love. All that Takashi would find of Midori after the atomic explosion were her charred bones with the remains of a rosary. In the years before his death in 1951, Takashi Nagai gave extraordinary comfort and hope to thousands. People of every faith in Nagasaki continue to honour his memory. The first stage in the process of his canonisation has begun.
