

Workbooks for First Confession and First Holy Communion have been ordered. These have to be sent from the United States, and this may take several weeks.

As yet, the date of Confirmation has still to be settled. Fr. MacKinnon is going to ask for a Sunday at the very end of January or the beginning of February, The date for First Holy Communion remains as it has been for several years: the first Sunday of June.

On Wednesday of this week, at his weekly audience, **Pope Francis** rebuked those who use their cell-phones to take pictures during Mass. A new reproduction of Salvador Dali's "Christ of St. John of the Cross" now hangs in the church porch. Why is it so called? Its inspiration comes from the Carmelite friar, poet and mystic, St John of the Cross. (1542-1591) He was praying, looking down on the sanctuary of the Convent of the Incarnation in Avila. Suddenly, he has a vision of the crucified Lord below him. Later, he did a sketch of what he had beheld. It is still preserved in the Convent of the Incarnation.
