

Appeal judges have now ruled that their right to conscientious objection means that they can now refuse to delegate, supervise or support staff involved in abortions. Many of you have actively supported the two midwives and will be pleased to know that the boundaries required for conscientious objection to be truly respected have now been clarified in law. EASTER FLOWERS



The Daffodil

The daffodil is a symbol of rebirth, a sign of the new beginnings that come with spring. Naturally, it would become the most popular Easter flower. There is a legend that the daffodil first appeared on the night of the Agony in the Garden of Gethsemane, to comfort Our Lord in his hour of sorrow. Many cancer charities throughout the world have chosen the daffodil as a symbol of hope. One American charity worker said: "You see a daffodil and know there's hope and with hope, there's a cure. They're a burst of sunshine, a ray of hope. Even if it is still cold outside, you know there's warmth and light ahead."



The Lily

Christ himself described the beauty of this flower: "Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow: they toil not, neither do they spin and yet Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these." Sometimes called the "white-robed apostles of hope," lilies are also said to have been found growing in the Garden of Gethsemane after Our Lord's Agony. They are easily associated with the pure light of the Risen Lord. They are also Our Lady's special flower. In Christian art the angel Gabriel is often depicted with a lily in his hand as he comes to Mary in the Annunciation. There is a legend that when Eve left the Garden of Eden she shed real tears of repentance, and from those remorseful tears sprung up the first lilies.
