

It is just possible that this was the sort of coin that our Lord took in his hand in today's Gospel. It is a Roman denarius, showing the head of Tiberius, Emperor at the time of Our Lord's public ministry. The abbreviated letters are translated as "Caesar Augustus Tiberius, Son of the Divine Augustus". The seated female on the other side represents "Pax or "Peace" and is usually identified as Tiberius's mother, Livia. We see written, "Pontife(x) Maxim(us)", an ancient religious title the Emperors took to themselves. Eventually, it would become a papal title.

Those of us who remember the pre-decimal coinage might also remember that the "d" used regarding the penny came from the Roman "denarius". Coin collectors value the so-called "Tribute Penny." The coin shown above could sell for £1,000, if not more.
