

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#### **OUOTATIONS FROM ST. AUGUSTINE**

Even the straws under my knees shout to distract me from prayer.

It was pride that changed angels into devils; it is humility that makes men as angels.

God provides the wind: Man must raise the sail.

The truth is like a lion. You don't have to defend it. Let it loose. It will defend itself.

The Bible was composed in such a way that as beginners mature, its meaning grows with them.

To fall in love with God is the greatest romance; to seek him the greatest adventure; to find him, the greatest human achievement. You have made us for yourself, O Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you.

So late I loved you, O Beauty ever ancient and ever new! So late I loved you!

People travel to wonder at the height of mountains, at the huge waves of the sea, at the long courses of rivers, at the vast compass of the ocean, at the circular motion of the stars; and they pass by themselves without wondering.

No man can be a good bishop if he loves his title but not his task.

We were ensnared by the wisdom of the serpent; we are set free by the foolishness of God.

Trust the past to God's mercy, the present to God's love, and the future to God's providence.

### QUOTATIONS ABOUT ST. AUGUSTINE

He was himself a true African. Indeed, we may say he was an African first and a Roman afterwards, since, in spite his genuine loyalty towards the Empire, he shows none of the specifically Roman patriotism which marks Ambrose or Prudentius. (Christopher Dawson).

No one, it seems to me, can hope to equal Augustine. Who, nowadays, could hope to equal one who, in my judgment, was the greatest in an age fertile in great minds? (Petrarch, in 1373),

In the history of thought and civilization, Saint Augustine appears to me to be the first thinker who brought into prominence and undertook an analysis of the philosophical and psychological concepts of person and personality. These ideas, so vital to contemporary man, shape not only Augustine's own doctrine on God but also his philosophy of man: man as an individual, man as a member of societies and institutions — the family, the city, the state and the Church.
