

The 50th anniversary of President John F. Kennedy's assassination has been commemorated and has been the subject of many documentaries and newspaper articles. On the same day as his tragic death, C S Lewis also died. Many of you will know of him as the author whose writing gave us the film *Narnia*. He wrote many other books which established him as one of the most influential Christian writers of the 20th century. He was quite simply a great Christian communicator! An unbeliever who converted to the Anglican faith, Lewis was also a close friend of JRR Tolkien, author of *The Lord of the Rings*, himself a devout Catholic. C.S. Lewis has at last been given his memorial in Poets' Corner in Westminster Abbey. Well overdue, some might say.
